## **Chainsaws: Essential Safety Precautions**

Chainsaws are powerful tools that require proper training and safety measures to prevent serious injuries. Here are key safety requirements for chainsaw use in NCC T&D workplaces:

## Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)

Workers using chainsaws must wear:

- 1. Head Protection Hard Hat: Protects against falling objects, especially when working in forestry or areas with overhead hazards.
- 2. Eye and Face Protection Safety Goggles or Glasses: Shields eyes from wood chips, sawdust, and debris. Face Shield: Provides additional protection for the face from flying debris; should be used in combination with safety glasses.
- 3. Hearing Protection Earplugs or Earmuffs: Reduces exposure to chainsaw noise, which can exceed 85 decibels and cause hearing damage over time.
- 4. Hand Protection Cut-Resistant Gloves: Protects hands from cuts, abrasions, and vibration-related injuries. Look for gloves with anti-vibration features for prolonged use.
- 5. Leg Protection Chainsaw Chaps or Trousers: Made of cut-resistant material to protect legs from accidental contact with the chainsaw chain. OSHA and HSE recommend chaps meeting ANSI or EN381 standards.
- 6. Foot Protection Steel-Toe Boots: Provides protection from heavy objects and chainsaw impact. Cut-Resistant Boots: Offers additional protection for feet and ankles. Ensure the boots have slip-resistant soles for stability.
- 7. Body Protection High-Visibility Clothing: Enhances visibility in forestry or construction sites. Cut-Resistant Jacket (Optional): Offers additional protection for the upper body, especially in high-risk scenarios.
- 8. Respiratory Protection (if needed): Dust Mask or Respirator: Recommended when working in environments with excessive sawdust or poor ventilation.

## **Proper Safe Operations for Chainsaw Use**

Operating a chainsaw safely requires knowledge, skill, and strict adherence to safety guidelines. Here's a comprehensive guide to ensure safe chainsaw operations, aligned with industry best practices:

- Pre-Operation Checks Inspect the Chainsaw: Ensure the chain is sharp, tensioned correctly, and lubricated. Verify that safety features (chain brake, throttle lock, chain catcher, etc.) are functioning properly.
- Fueling: Refuel the chainsaw in a well-ventilated area, away from ignition sources. Use the correct fuel mixture
- PPE Check: Wear appropriate personal protective equipment (e.g., helmet, goggles, chaps, gloves, boots).
- Preparing the Work Area Clear the Area: Remove obstacles and debris that could interfere with your footing or chainsaw operation. Ensure bystanders are at a safe distance (at least 50 feet).
- Plan Your Escape Route: Identify at least two clear paths to retreat in case of a falling tree or emergency.
- Starting the Chainsaw Safe Start Method: Use the ground start or leg-lock method; never drop start the chainsaw. Engage the chain brake before starting.
- Inspect the Idle Speed: Ensure the chain does not move when the engine is idling.
- Operating the Chainsaw Maintain Proper Grip and Stance: Hold the chainsaw firmly with both hands (thumbs wrapped around the handles).
- Stand with your feet shoulder-width apart for balance. Work at Waist Level: Avoid cutting above shoulder height to maintain control. Avoid the Kickback Zone: Do not let the upper tip of the chainsaw bar touch objects. This can cause dangerous kickback.
- Cut with the Lower Part of the Bar: Use the portion closest to the chainsaw body for better control.
- Cutting Safely Proper Tree Felling Technique: Assess the tree's lean, branches, and wind direction before cutting.
- Create a notch (face cut) in the tree on the side facing the fall direction. Make the back cut slightly above the notch to control the fall.
- Limbing and Bucking: Cut branches (limbing) while standing on the opposite side of the trunk.



- When bucking (cutting a log), avoid cutting from underneath the log to prevent pinching.
- During Operation Take Breaks: Rest periodically to avoid fatigue, which can lead to accidents.
- Monitor Surroundings: Stay alert for changes in conditions, such as shifting trees, unstable ground, or nearby workers.
- Post-Operation Procedures Turn Off the Chainsaw: Engage the chain brake and turn off the engine before moving or refueling.
- Clean and Store the Chainsaw: Clean the bar, chain, and air filters. Store the chainsaw in a dry, secure location.
- Emergency Preparedness First Aid Kit: Have a first aid kit readily available for cuts or injuries.
- Training Ensure operators are trained to handle emergencies, including kickback and injuries.

## **Common Mistakes to Avoid**

- Operating the chainsaw without proper PPE.
- Using a dull or poorly maintained chain.
- Cutting above shoulder height or in an unstable position.
- Ignoring hazards such as dead branches, unstable trees, or ground obstacles.

By following these guidelines, operators can minimize risks and ensure safe, efficient chainsaw use.
